Curriculum Update

It is my pleasure to share an overview of our school improvement process and our academic goals for the 2025-26 school year with you. A few years ago we adopted a multi-year district improvement plan focused around four main areas: literacy, math, social-emotional learning, and assessment. In the fall, we will continue working towards accomplishing our goals in each area. The full district improvement plan with details related to associated strategies can be found on the district website by clicking "Our District" and then selecting "District Improvement Plan."

Each area has a Panther Improvement Team (P.I.T. Crew) made up of staff members from across the district that meets on our professional development days to make progress towards implementing the associated strategies. We look forward to getting our state assessment data in the fall to better understand the progress we've made towards accomplishing our goals.

OUR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT CYCLE LOOKS LIKE THIS...

- Over the summer: Using feedback from the staff and the documented end-of-year progress, the District Improvement Plan is updated.
- In the fall: We roll out the updated District Improvement Plan when staff return. The updated District Improvement Plan will be posted on the website no later than the first day of school.
- Fall, Winter, and Spring: We analyze our benchmark (FastBridge for literacy and SpringMath) data and/or state data to determine progress, set grade level and/or department goals, and monitor implementation of the plan.
- Half-Day Professional Development Meetings: Our PIT Crews meet throughout the year to work on implementing the strategies with each goal.
- June Regular Board Meeting: The PIT Crews share out their team's progress with the Board, and then the cycle repeats.

EXAMPLES OF STRATEGIES USED TO ACCOMPLISH GOALS

We have been implementing Science of Reading and Science of Math approaches to improve literacy and math outcomes for our students. Preliminary data has been very promising. We have also been re-establishing an MTSS (Multi-Tiered Systems of Support) framework, including creation of a MTSS handbook to ensure we document our systems.

In both of these content areas, we have been working on ensuring a guaranteed, viable curriculum for all students by having teams of staff identify priority standards and then work on vertical alignment between grade levels. This means that no matter who a child's teacher is, all students in the same grade will be taught the most important standards, with the goal of helping every student learn and succeed.

Our SEL team has ensured staff have been trained in several research-based practices such as: de-escalation techniques, creating trauma-sensitive learning environments, and suicide prevention training called QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer). This team also re-booted PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) to ensure behavior expectations are explicitly taught and reinforced to improve student behavior. **Our discipline data has shown significant improvements in this first year of implementation**.

Our assessment team has been trained and in turn trained the entire staff in best assessment, instructional, and grading

practices over the past two years. Our team also spent time evaluating which district-wide assessments students are taking, which resulted in an overall reduction of assessments. We have been developing a warehouse to ensure staff have access to all of this training and resources. Our team has also focused on student motivation and what can be done in our instructional approach to foster student hope and confidence.

One outcome of all of this work was bringing The Lion Heart Experience to our school and community in April. This experience aligned with goals of both the SEL and assessment teams, as it addressed bullying through the metaphor of students painting either a masterpiece or a mess in the lives of others with our words and was timed to help encourage and build up our students through the positive songs and messages.

We're working hard to make our school the best it can be by teaming up and focusing on shared goals. After building a strong foundation over the past few years, we're excited to grow even stronger partnerships with our families this year. Each of our improvement teams will be adding new ideas to help make this happen.



It's an honor to be here to serve alongside so many wonderful professionals as we strive to make school the best it can be for each of our students. Investing in Our Students... Understanding the 2025 Bond Proposal

The Stockbridge Community School District is asking the community to consider a bond proposal on November 4, 2025. Over the past few months, we've met with teachers, staff, coaches, transportation workers, and community members to listen to their ideas and needs.

The projects in this bond are needed to keep up with and improve the quality of services we provide. While consistently working to create more opportunities for students and staff, many of the items are simply about replacing old equipment and fixing areas that need repairs. We'll spread the purchases from this bond over the next five years so that our students and staff can benefit from these improvements for the next ten years and beyond.

Your vote on November 4, 2025, will help shape the future of our schools and our community.



If approved, this bond would generate about \$15.1 million and be paid off in 16 years.
