Dear Stockbridge Families and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2024-25 educational progress for Stockbridge Jr/Sr High School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. If you have any questions about the AER, please contact principal Jeffrey Trapp for assistance.

For the 2025-26 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2024-25. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2024-25. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2024-25. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, the label provided is "Universal Support" - not identified for CSI, ATS, or TSI.

Our school was identified as "**Universal Support**" - not identified for CSI, ATS or TSI. This is true for all schools in Stockbridge.

Stockbridge Junior/Senior High School's school [improvement plan](#) can be accessed in the fall on our website within our district's improvement plan. It is updated annually. Our school improvement plan focuses on increasing reading, writing, and mathematics proficiency. We continue to provide staff with professional development opportunities to have a continuous dialogue to review and analyze the curriculum in the high school. We have supporting classes for students who struggle in core areas. Our building leadership team continues to lead school improvement by setting school-wide goals and working on the culture and climate in our building. Department chairs are responsible for mentoring members of their department in designing and mapping out curricula in their subject areas.

Our core curriculum is strong as we have dedicated teachers who focus on best practices utilizing technology, problem-based learning, and engaging hands-on learning experiences. Our elective courses offer rigorous opportunities to connect to career paths. From robotics, agriculture, band, choir, art, journalism, yearbook, woodworking, welding, and construction trades our school enriches students across a wide range of interests. We provide a technology-rich learning environment for everyone to foster creativity, critical thinking, communication, and collaboration in a digital environment.

At Stockbridge Junior/Senior High School we are intentional about all that we do to increase student achievement. Each year is filled with relevant opportunities for rigorous learning and growth. For the 2025-2026 school year, our district has 4 main improvement goals centered around Literacy, Math, SEL, and Assessment. Our staff are also wanting to model and promote our four core values:

- We value our students' identities and diversity within our community and in our world.
- We value cross-curricular integration to promote relevance in student learning.
- We value a curriculum that invites students to apply their skills and learning to a variety of situations.
- We value opportunities where students can make mistakes, recover, and show growth in their learning.

Our curriculum guide is posted on our website: [www.panthern.net](http://www.panthern.net) and it follows the Michigan Merit Curriculum Standards. We also follow the Michigan Common Core Standards.

Family communication continues to be an important part of our school culture with a monthly newsletter and our social media platforms. We continue to have steady participation for parent/teacher conferences, averaging around 30% of our families.

Dual enrollment allows students to take college courses as part of their high school curriculum and earn both college credit and high school credit. During 2023-2024, 7.6% of 184 students participated, and for 2024-2025, 7.8% of 165 students were enrolled in dual enrollment.

Stockbridge High School junior and senior students also have the opportunity to participate at the Wilson Talent Center to take courses in vocational and technical courses. Students can choose courses in six career pathways. The Wilson Talent Center serves all of Ingham County Schools and is located in Mason, Michigan.

Our high school has several on-site Advanced Placement courses from which students can choose.

We offered the following AP classes during the 2025-2026 school year:

AP Literature  
AP Language  
AP Precalculus  
Calculus AB  
AP World History

In 2024-2025 32 students or 10% of 316 students were enrolled in AP/IB courses and 75% of students taking an AP exam received a score leading to college credit. Please see our most recent data presentation [here](#).
